Batiquitos Lagoon Resiliency Plan Project Underway

Multiyear Effort Will Review Effects of Climate Change


The Carlsbad City Council recently approved spending \$100,000 to create a 'resiliency plan' for the Batiquitos Lagoon. The plan would map out how to protect the lagoon and surrounding habitat from the ill-effects of climate change, including sea-level rise, changing weather and wave patterns, and others.

The first steps toward creating the Batiquitos Lagoon Resiliency Plan were taken in 2008, when the BLF sought and was awarded a grant to help the California Department of Fish and Wildlife develop a plan to manage and monitor the resiliency plan process for Batiquitos Lagoon Ecological Reserve (BLER). The funds supporting this and other associated grants come from Carlsbad's *Agricultural Conversion Mitigation Fees*, which are paid by developers who build on land formerly used for agriculture.

Some of the grant money had already been appropriated, but funds for the management and monitoring portion of the project were withheld pending further review and subsequent City Council action. After years of delay, Carlsbad councilmembers approved the \$100,000 partial appropriation on April 11, clearing the way for the project to proceed.

Under the grant, the BLF will partner with the City of Carlsbad, the state Department of Fish and Wildlife, and the Climate Science Alliance-South Coast to research the potential effects of climate change on the lagoon, and then develop ways to prevent or mitigate harm to the ecological reserve. Our resiliency project will use a new protocol and process called *Climate Understanding and Resiliency in the River Valley (CURRV)*, which was developed by the Tijuana River National Estuarine Research Reserve. A key component of this is the engagement of land managers, scientists, regulatory agencies and other stakeholders (e.g., the City of Carlsbad, Aviara Master Association, Park Hyatt – Aviara, Leucadia Waste Water District, Caltrans, SANDAG) to evaluate different climate change scenarios and develop appropriate adaptation strategies that address potential impacts on sensitive resources. The pictures below, part of a presentation to the Carlsbad City Council, show examples of climate change effects to consider, and outline how the project will unfold.

Our project is divided into four phases: Phase I: Scenario planning and identification of data needs, including identifying relevant existing data and pinpointing key information gaps; Phase II: Data collection as needed to fill the identified gaps; Phase III: Development of adaptation strategies; and Phase IV: preparation of the final report. Our anticipated date for completing the Phase IV final report is the Summer of 2019. Future newsletter articles and postings on our website will provide more information as our project proceeds.


Higher Costs & Measure A Defeat = I-5 Project Funding Shortage

Planned Trail Extension, Pedestrian Bridge over Batiquitos Lagoon in Limbo

A major funding shortfall in the region's TransNet program is forcing officials to take away money that was earmarked for several transportation and mitigation projects, including one that would have widened Interstate 5 from San Elijo Lagoon north into Carlsbad, added a pedestrian/bicycle bridge across Batiquitos Lagoon, and connected the new bridge crossing trial to the North Shore trail east of the freeway.

In December, the San Diego Association of Governments (SANDAG) disclosed \$8.4 billion in cost increases for major transportation projects already underway and being funded by TransNet, the sales tax-funded regional infrastructure upgrade program. It was approved by voters in 1987 and extended in 2004.

During the November 2016 general election, San Diego voters rejected Measure A, which would have levied an additional half-cent sales tax to pay for a list of additional TransNet projects. TransNet's funding woes were made worse by SANDAG's use of flawed



economic projections that significantly overestimated future income from the existing tax levy (and projected proceeds from the failed Measure A). Revenue from the existing TransNet program is 25% lower than projected, and the program now faces a budget gap of more than \$17 million, according the **Voice of San Diego.**

Just last year, the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) received approval for extending the I-5 transportation corridor to include freeway construction through San Elijo and Batiquitos Lagoons, part of TransNet's North Coast Corridor project. That part of the project included replacing and double tracking the railroad bridge across Batiquitos Lagoon, the lagoon trail connector, and construction of a pedestrian and bike bridge and trail on the west side of I-5 between La Costa Avenue and Poinsettia Lane. Construction of the I-5 corridor beyond the Poinsettia Lane interchange through to Camp Pendleton was contingent on voter approval of Measure A in the November 2016 elections. Unfortunately Measure A fell short of the two-thirds approval needed for passage.

Caltrans and SANDAG now say TransNet can only pay for the I-5 improvements extending through the northern shore of San Elijo Lagoon. There may be funds to complete the railroad bridge replacement and double-tracking across Batiquitos Lagoon, but the rest is on hold. Caltrans, SANDAG, and the California Department of Fish and Wildlife are exploring funding options for constructing the I-5 and trail improvements along the Batiquitos Lagoon segment of the freeway. The included picture depicts the current situation at Batiquitos Lagoon. The BLF remains hopeful that funding can be identified, and we update you on the project's status as we receive more information.

Nature Center Speaker Series June 10: Rattlesnake 101 with Vocational Herpetologist

The next speaker appearing at the Batiquitos Lagoon Nature Center is Steve Bledsoe, avocational herpetologist and native Californian. The event is on June 10, from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m. It's free and open to the public.


Bledsoe will present an enlightening talk on *Rattlesnakes*. He made his living as a machinist, design engineer and business owner, but he has had a lifelong interest in biology and zoology. Today, he's active with Southwest Field Herping Associates, and has given safety and educational talks about snakes throughout the region. Special treat: Bledsoe will bring along some live snakes.

On May 13, the speaker series featured Richard Halsey, a chaparral researcher and director of the nonprofit California Chaparral Institute, which is dedicated to preserving and protecting the shrubs and sage that dominate the Southern California landscape. His topic was "Nature Around the Lagoon," and included a discussion of California's extensive varieties of chaparral and the aromatic California Sage Scrub. Halsey is a former biology teacher and an expert in chaparral ecology. He's also trained as a wildland firefighter and has written a book on wildfire called, *Fire, Chaparral and Survival in Southern California*.

The monthly speaker series is organized by BLF Board member Liz Paegel. Other speakers this year have included local author and geology professor Keith Meldahl (Batiquitos Lagoon geology, marine terraces, and how this land

shifted north); State Park Ranger Cory Hawkins (Least terns); and ornithologist Dena Emmerson, who spoke about our nature trail and about Carlsbad's Habitat Management Plan, its Preserve System, and its trail plans. Meldahl's book, *Surf, Sand and Stone*, is in the Nature Center library now for your perusal.



Signs of 'Wasting' Disease During 2017 King Tide

A "wasting" disease brought on by the continual warming of our ocean water has decimated the collection of starfish and urchins we used to see at the Ponto jetties and along the bridge supports by the coast highway. This has been noticed over the last four years during our annual visits to the jetty area during the extreme high and low "King" tides of January and February. There were no starfish or urchins, there were very few clams and oysters, and the barnacles were down 60% to 70%.

The kelp beds, starting about four years ago, have all but vanished as well. Fortunately, this was not a complete die-off. The kelp plants retained small growth at the ocean's bottom, but lost their long strands of growth. The kelp beds have now returned, as seen by the piles of seaweed that dot our beaches after a storm.

A year earlier, we saw the trickle-down effect of climate change on sea lions. There were three starving and listless sea lion pups under one of the coast highway bridges. When we reported their location to the nearest lifeguard station, the lifeguard commented, "They are dying of starvation all over the county beaches. Their food supply of anchovies and other bait fish have migrated north to cooler waters." It's clear that ocean warming and climate change is upon us, and other changes are in store. Our job is to be aware of it and to help where we can.


